Rule One: A verb must agree with its subject in number.

## Examples

Singular subject => singular verb


- Plural subject => plural verb


Rule Two: The subject never appears in a prepositional phrase.

- To find the subject, cross out the prepositional phrase.
- Reminder: a preposition are words such as: of, in, on, above, below, along, with, near, etc.
- A pair of kitchen scissors (is, are) in the second drawer.
- My sister, along with her friends, (has, have) invited me to the party.

Rule Three: A verb agrees with its subject even when the verb comes before the subject.

- There (is, are) a spelling mistake in my homework.
- Where (is, are) the children's coats?

Rule Four: Subjects joined by and generally take a plural verb.

- A patchwork quilt and a sleeping bag (covers, cover) my bed in the winter.
- A crusty baking pan and a greasy plate (sit, sits) on the countertop.

Rule Five: When subjects are joined by either...or, nor, neither or not only... but also, the verb agrees with the subject closer to the verb.

- Either my dog or the squirrels (eat, eats) the breadcrusts I put out for my dog.
- Neither the squirrels nor my dog (eat, eats) the breadcrusts I put out for the birds.

Rule Six: Words ending in -one, -body, -thing take singular verbs; also each, either, neither.

- Each of the students (is, are) using Twitter in the classroom.
- Everyone (loves, love) Ms. Wolbers' class, because she is SO nice and NEVER tortures students with giant essay assignments.

Rule Seven: Units of time, mass, money, length \& distance take singular verbs.

- Four hours (is, are) a short time to wait for concert tickets.
- Three centimetres (seems, seem) like a small amount, but my hair looks much shorter!
